## THE SERVICE OF WITNESS TO THE RESURRECTION

The Service of Witness to the Resurrection is an affirmation of faith in God's love for all people, a love that strengthens and supports, even in the midst of grief. In this service we bear witness to the sure and certain hope of eternal life, promised in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The resurrection is a central doctrine of the Christian faith, and shapes Christians' attitudes and responses to the event of death. Death brings loss, sorrow, and grief to all. We don't deny those emotions and experiences. In the face of death Christians affirm with tears and joy the hope of the Gospel. The joy and triumph of Christ's resurrection is proclaimed through the hymns we sing, the prayers we offer and the scriptures we read.

Furthermore, Christians do not bear bereavement in isolation, but are sustained by the power of the Spirit in and through the community of faith. The church is that community of faith that offers a ministry of love and hope to all who grieve.

The Paschal Candles on the Communion table symbolize the light of the risen Christ, which shines even in the midst of the darkness of death. The cross above the chancel reminds us of Christ's ultimate sacrifice that gives us the gift of life after death. And the silences in our worship remind us of the loneliness of death that are greeted by the joyful sounds of worship, reminding us that God has triumphed over death.
